

Getting Results at the Local Level ... Cobb County, GA

We are in our first year of mapping in Area 4 of the Cobb Co. School District located in suburban Atlanta. Area 4 has approximately 17,000 students of the 105,000 students in Cobb. Obviously undertaking a mapping initiative in 18 schools at the elementary, middle, and high school levels is a huge task. However, we have

found careful planning and the development of our own materials to be the keys to a successful first year. We spent an entire year in 2004-2005 preparing for implementation of mapping this school year. All participants agree that this was time well spent. Rather than slowing the process down, the attention to detail and selection of the right teacher leaders have actually enhanced the quality of training and coaching of others. Doing things the iż½rightiż½ way and the iż½Cobbiż½ way have been critical to the process.

At this point, all teachers have mapped one preparation at the middle and high school levels and for specialists at the elementary level. Core elementary teachers have mapped math, a choice based on new state standards and the area in which our students need the improvement. We are in the process of beginning first Read Throughs. As with all schools that begin the mapping process, the conversations have been rich, the collaborative work powerful, and the appreciation for each other rewarding. Principals are excited to see a renewed focus on the curriculum and more sharing among teachers. Combined with our district purchasing laptop computers for our teachers this spring and our adoption of a software package for mapping this summer, we are looking forward to a productive 2006- 2007 with our mapping efforts.

When we talk about the value of mapping, it is normal to think of the obvious: alignment of curriculum, prioritizing of standards, incorporation of benchmark assessments, integration of curriculum and all the other benefits that one usually sees. However, it is perhaps the less obvious incidents that have been the most meaningful: the admiration of a 30-year veteran teacher for the wide array of quality assessments included in the maps of a first year teacher and the feeling of pride voiced by teachers for their

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own work. I think this message from Susan Eppley, a new teacher at Keheley Elementary School makes the point best:

I thought I'd share my thoughts as a "new" teacher about the mapping. I am excited about it for several reasons. I think it will create an environment of collaboration within our teams, school, and with the parents. I feel it is a very professional way to handle the information we deliver to our children and provides a level of accountability that is not punitive but proactive. I think it's a wonderful way to help new teachers feel they can be effective in the classroom instead of feeling like they're always two steps behind in lessons. Oh, and the opportunity for communicating lessons and units to and from student teachers is pretty exciting. I know I'm getting ahead of myself so let me bring it back to the present by finishing up with this; I see it as a way to be "published" and to share my ideas with others in a safe way without the risk of being judged. I guess I'm trying to say it's leveling the playing field for all teachers from the 25 year veterans to the new ones like me.


